**LEARNING IN A** TIME OF CRISIS

Learning in a time of crisis - how our faculty, staff, students, parents and Providence Catholic community pulled together to find success.

hen March rolled around, no one was anticipating that in-person schooling would soon come to a screeching halt due to Covid-19.

E-learning at that point wasn't something the world had prepared for in the event of an extended amount of time away from the physical classroom. As always, our faculty and staff rose to the occasion and came up with education plans, technological opportunities, and growth opportunities for students. Students rose above the difficulty of not learning in person - and missing out on a great number of year-end activities and traditions to make the most of this new way of learning. And parents stepped up to guide their students in the right direction, keeping them on task and adjusting to the new normal.

Our initial feedback was that E-Learning is successful, given the circumstances under which it was initiated. We will continue to work with families and faculty to adjust and supplement e-learning if it is needed in the future.

"The faculty and staff have been exemplary in their work, and the teachers are to be commended for making such a 'remote' experience of learning a 'personal' experience," says Father John Merkelis, President of Providence Catholic. "I am very proud of the way we have worked together to provide continued instruction under such challenging conditions."

Weekly masses were implemented, thanks to filming assistance from David Ripp '84, a Providence Catholic parent. In addition, social media was used to engage and connect the Providence Catholic community throughout the e-learning experience - which you will see throughout the next few pages of this magazine.

"At one point, early on in the stay-at-home order, I walked into the building and heard music. I immediately walked toward the gym, and found our dining services team Lynn, Diane, Anne, Araceli and Terra

singing (and maybe dancing) as they cleaned and disinfected the kitchen. Maintenance members Larry, Dean, Donna, Jenny, Jim, Victor, Frank and Gerardo diligently took apart every classroom, and coated each desk with disinfectant while stacking one side of the room with desks as they sanitized and disinfected the floor, then moved everything across the room to finish," says Father Merkelis. "Though faculty and staff are all still busy with the work that needs to be done, there is now an eerie silence throughout the halls of the school. It is a reminder to me - to all of us, really - that the heart and soul of Providence Catholic is not the building we are all familiar with, but the students, faculty, staff, and families that bring the sound of joy and God to life within the walls."

I am grateful for the opportunity to write to you on behalf of the friars of the Midwest Augustinian Province! In these unprecedented and fearful times. I find consolation in the fact that the message of the Gospels is one of hope and perseverance.

# PASSION IN WEATHER

Chasing his passion and finding a career path that was meant to be.



Schultz '02 found his passion for weather research.
"I was fascinated from then on about the weather," says Christopher. "I would go to the library, learn about how tornados form, watch Tom Skilling every day on television. I learned a lot from him, because he has a way of communicating not just the forecast, but the science behind it."

Today, Christopher is a Research Scientist at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center's Earth Science Branch. His focus is on lightening and severe weather, and he is particularly interested in thundersnow. Upon graduating from Providence Catholic, Chris attended the University of Missouri where he earned his Bachelor's Degree in Atmospheric Science. He then went on to get his Master's Degree and Ph.D. in Atmospheric Science at the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

"Before graduate school, I was able to do a lot of storm chasing," says Christopher. "I knew if I wanted to go on to the National Weather Service, I would need my Master's Degree. While in grad school, I developed a passion for research, which I hadn't anticipated. I was offered a Ph.D. fellowship which allowed me the opportunity to go into hurricanes and to study snowfall – all different aspects of weather."

Some of the most exciting work he's done was related to thundersnow. "We had a couple of events in the southeast, and one of the coolest discoveries I made is that most of the lightning in winter storms is triggered by antennae or tall buildings. Especially in wintertime, like the Groundhog's Day blizzard of 2011. Tall buildings like the Willis tower were initiating their own lightning because they were up in the clouds and the clouds generated the background electric field needed. It was amazing to see."

Now that he has his Ph.D. and is working for NASA, Christopher enjoys heading into work every day. The most important thing he does though, in his eyes, is help people make better weather decisions.



"I get to do what I love every day," says Christopher. "I wanted to be involved in something where what I was saying really mattered. One of my long-term goals growing up was to help with the warning process. I am fortunate to have contributed to this goal through the development of a lightning-based algorithm that helps forecasters identify when a storm has become severe. The path to NASA was forged by my interactions with incredible weather service personnel during the development of that algorithm. Digging into all the science data to develop new understandings of weather is something I do daily. Once or twice a year I go out and work with aircraft, or embed myself in a hazardous weather testbed and work with forecasters to train them on new products and ideas. Each day is different but all focused around something I am passionate about."

Christopher is proud of what meteorologists and researchers have been able to accomplish in terms of storm safety, especially since 1990.

"The biggest improvement is the technology advances we have made in weather observations and data availability, which has made studying weather and disseminating warnings easier," he says. "Everyone has weather information in the palm of their hand. People have a general understanding of radar, and take action when they are notified when severe weather or lightning is in their area."

As for what he would tell students looking to move into a STEM field, Christopher says, "The biggest thing is perseverance. You're not

going to walk into a lab and get the right results the first time out and say you made a great discovery. You're going to have some good times, you're going to have times where you have to go in and understand why something didn't happen the way you thought it would. Grades are important, but it is the skills you learned while doing the project that are most important in the end."

Chris lives in Madison Alabama with his wife Elise and three children.





### **A BEAUTIFUL** LIFE, A LASTING **LEGACY**

Kathryn Kestel's life was a beautiful patchwork, and her time at Providence remained one of her treasured memories throughout her life. So much so, that her daughter established a scholarship for future students.

ife is like a patchwork quilt – each square is a unique design, like each memory we hold in our hearts. For Kathryn Kestel, her time at Providence in the 1930s was a bright and colorful pattern that she held close to her heart for the rest of her life.

"My mom was a petite person, only five feet tall and never weighed more than 100 pounds, but she had a lot of energy and a lot of pep," says Margaret Benoit, the daughter of the late Kathryn. Kathryn, a 1932 graduate, was always extremely proud to be a Providence graduate - so much so that Margaret and her husband Bill established an endowed scholarship with a gift to the school. The Arthur & Kathryn Kennedy Memorial Scholarship is named after Kathryn and her husband.

"When she went to Providence, the woman she lived with was blind," says Margaret, who explained that in those days, the girls often lived with a different family closer to the school. "The woman had several boarders

who went to Providence and walked back and forth to school every day. When they walked, they looked for little pieces of tinfoil that would be on the ground because the nuns were collecting them for a project."

Kathryn had a zest for living. She cared deeply for the people in her life, and her curiosity and love of learning kept her current with the times. "She did not go to college so PCHS was the highlight of her life. She was the only one in her family to go to Providence."

Kathryn was a faithful donor to the school during her life. "She just got a kick out of it," says Margaret. "She'd say 'Look, I'm the oldest living donor!' She lived to 100. At her 100th birthday party held at Our Lady of Angels, a woman from Providence came and brought a lovely card and gave her a Providence jacket. She adored it!"

For Kathryn, her time at Providence is memorialized in a scholarship, and in a quilt she created based on her life. "In the 1980s, she started a quilt that is St. Rose in Wilmington.

the story of her life and also the times she lived through. It's called 'Yesterdays Remembered' and has 99 squares. One of the squares features Providence High School," says Margaret. The quilt was one of 16,000 quilts registered with the Illinois Quilt Project. Twohundred of these quilts were chosen to be in a book about the legacy of Illinois guilting -Kathryn's quilt was one of them.

About Mrs. Kathryn Kestel: Kathryn grew up on a farm on Cedar Road near New Lenox. She was one of five children born to Peter and Louise Kestel. Her parents wanted a Catholic high school education for her and they decided on Providence. She served as class president.

She married Arthur M. Kennedy and had two children, Margaret and Robert. In her married life, she lived on a farm near Wilmington, IL. She had many interests 2 including china painting, quilting, gardening, baking, and collecting treasures at antique sales,. She Z loved belonging to several clubs, and was very active in her church,

#### THE TAX CREDIT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM: HOW IT WORKS SCHOLARSHIP INVEST IN KIDS ACT DONORS STUDENTS ORGANIZATION **SCHOLARSHIP** The Invest in Kids Tax Credit Scholarship Program offers a 75 percent income tax credit to individuals and businesses that contribute to qualified Scholarship Granting Organizations (SGOs). The SGOs then provide scholarships for students whose families meet the income requirements to attend qualified, non-public schools in Illinois.

#### UNDERSTANDING THE TAX CREDIT.

Donors who give to Empower Illinois receive a 75% tax credit for the amount of their gift, up to \$1 million. In addition, any portion of the tax credit may be carried forward for up to five years. Therefore, the tax credit is incentive for a donor to increase the amount they donate in tuition assistance. Someone who owes \$5,000 in state income tax and normally gives \$1,000 in tuition assistance is out of pocket \$6,000 per year. That same donor may now donate \$4,000 to Empower Illinois (earning a 75% tax credit or the equivalent of \$3,000 off their state income taxes) and will now owe the state only \$2,000 in income taxes (\$5,000 liability, minus \$3,000 tax credit). The donor is still out of pocket \$6,000 but they have quadrupled their impact. This example is illustrated below.

#### **About the Scholarship**



The Foundation's mission was to provide full tuition and college scholarships to caddies with limited financial means. The first two Evans Scholars enrolled at Northwestern University in 1930, and since then, more than 11,050 outstanding young men and women have graduated as Evans Scholars. This year, there are 1,010 Evans Scholars enrolled at 18 leading universities nationwide."

**THE BRANKIN SIBLINGS** 12,020 miles around the globe. 6 countries in 17 days. 3 siblings experiencing the world - together.

he year 2019 was a year of many celebrations for the Brankin family. In addition to celebrating the 25th wedding anniversary of their parents, all three of the Brankin children graduated in the same year. Ryan Brankin (PCHS Class of 2014) received both a B.S. and M.S. in Accounting from Purdue University. Colin Brankin (PCHS Class of 2016) graduated Summa Cum Laude in three years with a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from the University of Notre Dame. Allison Brankin was distinguished as the Valedictorian of Providence Catholic Class of 2019.

Following graduation, Ryan earned his Certified Public Accountant (CPA) certification and started as an assurance associate at RSM US LLP in Indianapolis. Colin moved to Salt Lake City to work as a process engineer for Procter & Gamble. Allison began her college career at the University of Notre Dame studying chemical engineering.

As all three of the Brankin children saw their futures taking them on different journeys throughout the country, they realized that the summer of 2019 provided a unique opportunity to do something together before setting off on their separate paths. A moment to deepen those familial bonds that would keep them connected over time and space. Memories to last a lifetime.

Thus, for 17 days, Ryan, Colin, and Allison traveled around the world as the "Brankin Backpacking Siblings". Starting in Reykjavik, they climbed the tallest waterfall in Iceland, hiked along black sand beaches, and scaled mountains populated with natural hot spring geysers. Next, they went to Barcelona to admire Gaudi's architectural masterpieces of Sagrada Familia and Parc Guell in addition to negotiating in Spanish at La Boqueria market. In Croatia, they explored the history of Old Town Dubrovnik on the Adriatic Sea and fed wild peacocks on the neighboring island of Lokrum. Traveling to Istanbul, they witnessed the intersection of Catholicism, Eastern Christianity, and Islam through the Hagia Sophia and Blue Mosque, surveyed the living residences of the ruling sultans of the Ottoman Empire at Topkapi Palace, and bartered for goods at the 565-year-old Grand Bazaar. In Budapest, they observed the changing of the guard at Buda Castle and climbed to the top of the Hungarian fortress Citadella to watch the sunset. Finishing up in Copenhagen, they took a canal ride to see the royal palaces of Christiansborg and Amalienborg and enjoyed the hundredyear-old roller coasters at Tivoli Gardens.

And yet, while the topography was remarkable and the sights were breathtaking, it was the nuances of the trip that made it memorable. Jumping into bone-chillingly cold waters in Dubrovnik. Racing through rainstorms in Denmark. Trying to pronounce words in Icelandic. Those times where they had no agenda and simply enjoyed the company of one another.

"Our adventure reminded us of our greatest childhood memories and strengthened those bonds of love that have always connected us," says Colin. "Now, as we have all moved on to the next stages of our lives, those moments which we shared live on in our memories. We have become more appreciative, more aware, and more connected – both to the cultures of our world and to one another."

The 2019 Marching Celtics had a recordbreaking and monumental competition season this fall! 


