Thank you for making this school year an amazing success, considering the obstacles and restrictions we faced. We had innumerable accomplishments this year, including:

- Offering full day classes, five days per week
- Implementing a hybrid model, dividing students into two cohorts so they could attend classes on campus on alternating days
- Installing audio-visual equipment and software in each classroom which allowed students at home to participate fully in classes
- Conducting professional development classes for teachers to support them in teaching in the hybrid model
- Offering lunch every day to bring a sense of "normal" to the day
- Developing a creative and innovative Open House
- Focusing on tours that were faithful to IDPH guidelines while introducing future Celtics to the Providence Family Spirit
- Winning a state championship in marching band
- Winning a state championship in dance
- Holding toy drives, food drives, sock drives and coat drives to support local shelters and non-profits
- Having Habitat for Humanity club members help build a house during Thanksgiving break
- · Practicing and competing in all sports:

basketball, wrestling, baseball, softball, football, lacrosse, soccer, cross-country, golf, tennis, volleyball, track and field, etc....

- Setting individual school records in track and basketball
- Fielding the first Girls Lacrosse team in school history
- Producing two theater productions
- Hosting 5 Kairos retreats for our senior
- Holding Celtic Energy Days for each class
- Competing in music at the state level and producing more All State performers than ever before
- Ending the school year with a larger enrollment than we started
- Hosting alumni speakers for career talks to students
- Conducting heart screening for our students
- Hosting trivia nights, March Madness competition, movie nights and pop-up lunch parties for all classes
- Broadcasting weekly Sunday Mass to our school community
- Celebrating monthly all-school Masses that were broadcasted to the larger PCHS community

The Common Good.

I think there may be an interesting doctoral thesis in studying the public relations statements by high schools during COVID. Ours was driven by our Mission Statement, particularly the Augustinian theme of the Common Good. Our decisions were always guided by the most recent medical and scientific research, measuring the metrics of the area, and keeping the health of our Providence Family foremost. We acted carefully and cautiously, considering those things that promoted safety and health for the most people, i.e., the Common Good.

We Announce.

Our S.T.E.M. program has been adjusted to be more "schedule-friendly" for our students by allowing them more freedom in choosing the math they prefer to study.

We announced an INCubatoredu program, an authentic entrepreneurship class. Many



parents and alums have volunteered to serve as coaches, mentors and judges.

This summer, watch for the return of camps, summer study skills, and several facility improvement projects. The installation of HVAC in the 200 wing completes the air conditioning of the school. An air exchange system will be added to the gym. The renovation of the grotto and a new and improved weight room are generously donated by Ron and Laura Plantz in memory of their son and our alum, Zac.

The 2021-22 School Year.

How are we preparing for next year? Our Re-opening committee (the faculty and staff who created such an efficient and successful schedule this year) has already begun our planning for next year.

- We are planning to have everyone back in school every day.
- We are installing upgraded HVAC in the classrooms in the 200 Wing, in the Sacred Heart Gym and in the boys' locker room and weight room.
- We will look at all we learned this year and continue to make changes for the common good. We will shift instructional practices and curriculum based on our experience of what works. Most importantly, we will focus on educating "the whole student" from an Augustinian perspective.

By the way, the tagline for the yearbook is, "Nothing Can Stop a Celtic." That sums up our year perfectly!

lanned gifts have had a tremendous impact on Providence Catholic. Estate gifts from friends and families of the school have allowed the school to make many campus improvements. The single largest endowment fund was funded with a bequest and to this day provides substantial needbased aid for tuition assistance. Many times, these gifts are unexpected and come at a most important time in the life of the school.

BRADLEY SWANSON, FORMER FACULTY, LEAVES MAJOR GIFT TO THE SCHOOL

Mr. Bradley Swanson taught English and Latin at Providence in the 1960's. He moderated both the Proviscope, student newspaper, and the Kelt school yearbook. He taught at the school during a most difficult time when the school faced closure with dwindling enrollment. The Save Our School Campaign raised awareness of the school's plight and support followed to help the school keep the doors open. Some of the credit is due to Mr. Swanson who was the school's public relations department.

The school received notice that Mr. Swanson passed away on October 27, 2019. A year later, the school was received notice that Mr. Swanson had named the school as his beneficiary of his estate. The school will benefit by funding earmarked for the athletic department, the music department and the humanities department in equal shares.

REMEMBERING PROVIDENCE CATHOLIC IN YOUR WILL

The simplest form of planned giving is to leave a bequest (gift) of money or specific

property to the school in your will. A will is a document that controls the disposition of a person's property at death. Many times, people avoid or delay making a will because they believe that it will increase the cost of administering their estate. In fact, the estates of all persons who die must be administered or settled whether they die with a will (testate) or without a will (intestate). A will can actually save expenses by eliminating the need for surety on bonds, expediting the sale of property, avoiding quardianship for minors where the same is not really necessary, and otherwise providing the executor of the will with clear instructions on the handling of the estate.

An individual without a will has no voice in the selection of the person who will administer their estate. Also, when there is no will, the court-appointed administrator makes distributions as provided by state law, after all debts and expenses have been paid.

If there is a will, the executor named by the maker of the will takes the place of the administrator and is the person who handles the estate. A person making a will in Illinois can name as executor any individual, a bank or a trust company, provided the executor meets the state statutory requirements.

A will gives you the ability to distribute your estate as you choose, take care of your needs and goals, and, plan effectively to reduce or eliminate estate taxes.

The first step in making a will is to call your attorney and make an appointment to begin the planning process. If you do not have an attorney, ask a friend or relative for a recommendation or call the local bar association lawyer referral line. Prior to your appointment, write out your goals and what you want to accomplish through your will. This will make the initial meeting with your

attorney much more productive.

It is very important that you follow your will planning process through to its completion. Once executed, you must

its completion. Once executed, you must store your will in a safe place and examine it periodically to ensure that it is current with your family needs and personal desires.

When making your will, please consider.

When making your will, please consider a planned gift to PCHS after you have provided for your family's needs. If you wish to continue the legacy and further the mission of Providence Catholic by naming the school in your will, the following general language is suggested:

MRS. MOSTYN ASKED, AND ALUMNI ANSWERED

When Mrs. Mostyn reached out in the last magazine to alumni to share the keepsakes she had held on to from her classes, the response was overwhelming. A beautiful testament to her teaching career, letters and emails from former students filled her mailbox as alumni shared with her where they are at now in life - and the role she played in theirs. Sean Willis '95 was one of those.

"To 'catch you up," he says, "I'm out in California nowadays, with a kid and my wife (Sarah) of nearly 13 years. We met in college at the University of Illinois, and have been together for now almost 24 years. I received my BS in Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering in '99, and after having some difficulty finding work in that field started selling cars at a local dealership in Joliet to pay the bills. I wended my way through IT, technical writing, electric motor design/development, bicycle repair, and for the past ten-plus years I've been literally working at my dream job of high school and college-era, as an engineer at Scaled Composites in Mojave, CA."

It is there that Sean has had the opportunity to help design, build, and test several unique manned aircraft, including the Stratolaunch Carrier Aircraft (www.scaled.com/portfolio/stratolaunch), the world's largest as measured by wingspan (385').

"I occasionally get to fly in our creations as a flight test engineer, and have also had the opportunity to act as a chase photographer. The photo to the left I took as part of our first flight press release, and was likely seen by millions when that flight made worldwide news for a cycle or two."

Added Sean, "You asked if I had 'followed my passion and (am) where I want to be'. I think the answer to the first part is emphatically yes, as on the card you sent I had written 'Pilot or Engineer'. Earlier in life I'd have probably written astronaut, and while I haven't (yet) been to space I've now met and worked with several people who have, and I've been closer than most (~54,000' aboard Proteus - www.scaled.com/portfolio/proteus/). I did get my Private Pilot's License awhile back too, though I have hardly flown as pilot in command since. It's been a satisfying progression professionally, and even the odd twists earlier in my career have been useful in countless different ways as I've moved forward."




It didn't take long for the emails to start rolling in for Mrs. Mostyn.

Anita (Pervan) Vadijan '96 wrote to Mrs. Mostyn in search of a card of her brother, Richie.

"I read the article written about your memory project in the Celtic Review and thought I would reach out," emailed Anita. "My youngest brother Richie Pervan also attended Providence and graduated in 2000. I was wondering if you could look through your index cards and see if you have any of Richie's? He passed away from cancer seven ago and this would be such a tremendous gift to have such a precious momento. I thoroughly enjoyed your article and can still hear your voice reading the 'Dear God' prayers every morning. Thank you for the memories."

It wasn't long before Mrs. Mostyn found Richie's card - and an additional writing of his.



"My family and I are absolutely over the moon right now!" responded Anita. "I am so touched that you responded so quickly and that you hung on to Richie's work. It's like we discovered a new piece of him and we are overjoyed. My hope is people see what an amazing story this is and at the heart of Providence is love."

Alumnus Kerry Muzzey reached out to Mrs. Mostyn as well, and shortly thereafter received the cards - and emailed back to share his feelings.

"Mrs. Mostyn, I got your letter today with the index cards. I recognized your writing before I even noticed the return address. It's so surreal - to touch this thing that feels like an artifact from a time gone by. I have this romantic notion that the things we touch hold memory, kinds like when you find a shoebox full of faded old photos. The nostalgia is almost a tactile thing. You are, and always have been, an amazing human being. Thank you for remembering my name. This has been such a nice surprise - a welcome connection in a time of disconnectedness. Truly."

Alumnus Jerry Hayes met Mrs. Mostyn prior to her time at Providence even though he's a graduate - and the lessons she taught him carry on to his students today.

"My name is Jerry Hayes. Although I'm a Providence Catholic Alumni (1981), I wasn't there when you arrived in 1983," he wrote. "My interaction with you as my teacher was at St. Joseph's Catholic School located in Lockport, IL during art class. One afternoon during class and after reviewing several student's work, you mentioned that regardless of the project, even if you can't make out the drawing or picture, always ask the author to tell you about it. This method benefits both the teacher/parent and the student/child.

Well, fast forward some 30+ years through corporate management and my involvement in politics, I relocated to Georgia and have been teaching elementary education for the past 14 years. Throughout the curriculum, I have always exercised your sound advice. Your teaching has inspired me and impacted hundreds if not thousands of parents and students. I thank God for you, and thank you for being a thoughtful and memorable individual. I was so delighted when I read the Fall edition of the Celtic Review and saw your lasting and impressive legacy you left through Mrs. Mostyn's Memory Project. May God continue to bless and keep you and your family."

Some alumni found that the future career they listed on that card in the beginning of their high school journey turned out to be exactly the career path they ended up taking, like Nathalie Brandes. She wrote:

"I think it is very interesting that on the index card you sent me, you asked us to write what we wanted to study in college (or maybe it was what career

we wanted to pursue). I listed geology or archaeology. My specialty is geoarchaeology, specifically in Britain and Scandinavia. It's amazing to realize that what I dreamed about so many years ago became a rewarding career. While I love conducting research, the best part of my career has been teaching. While not without many frustrations, the rewards have been fantastic. I must thank you for being an outstanding example of an excellent teacher. You are an inspiration. I wish you all the best and hope you enjoy retirement. With greatest respect and love, Nathalie

P.S. I still have the manila folder initials you cut out for me on my birthday."

"While tutoring in a Lockport program for the last 11 years, I had a private and lucrative business which allowed me to give adventures to my grandchildren, see plays in Chicago, stay at the Palmer House, fly on a moment's notice to surprise a grandchild on vacation in San Diego. Pretty fun life, " says Mrs. Mostyn.

To date, she has sent out well over 1,000 cards. She still has 604 left to return to their owners, and she has heard back after sending from around 180 former students.

"Who would have thought I would have had the best job of my life ahead of me?" she says. "The heartfelt stories are so wonderful to hear. My heart breaks, my admiration for so many escalates, and I'm humbled by those sharing. Their writing skills are extraordinary. Thank you God for this plan."

The coordinators, doctors, and volunteers of YH4L (Young Hearts for Life) transformed the BLC into an incredible scene where over 300 Providence students were screened for previously undetected underlying heart conditions. One of our sponsoring organizations was in memory of Brian Peck, a Providence alumnus who died in 2019 at the age of 20 of sudden cardiac death.

"Though HIPPA (rightly) prevents us from knowing who they were or what was found, YH4L contacted more than one family to alert them of an irregular EKG result and recommend follow up care," says Mrs. Katelyn Cornfield, English teacher, who coordinated the event for Providence. "We are so grateful to the Peck family and another organization (EKGs for EGK) for sponsoring our event so it could be free to our students."

Mrs. Cornfield hopes to hold the screening again every other year.

Providence Catholic music students earned 66 Superior awards (1st place medals) and four Excellent awards (2nd place medals) in addition to three performances selected as Best of Day in the IHSA Solo and Ensemble Competition in Music held in March.

"I also have to say I am so extremely proud of the two vocal choirs," said Dr. Stacy Eckert, Director of Choirs, Liturgical Music and Theatre. "They never rehearsed together prior to filming the video entry. That night was the first night any of them had sung together in a year - and they got SUPERIORS!"


Jameson Geers Signs with University of track, Minnesota to Continue Athletic Career in College




Mrs. Williams' Psychology class took time to learn about yoga and relaxation after their chapter on stress.


With the school "saved" from closing it was Fr. Kaffer's goal to stabilize the school environment, improve academics, continue to promote a strong sense of spirituality, maintain a family atmosphere, and expand both in numbers and plant facilities. He also wanted to expand extracurricular activities for both boys and girls. He established girls basketball and volleyball, and girls track soon followed. Pat was promoted to Assistant Principal and given the

responsibility of reorganizing the school codes. In discussions regarding what more could the school offer the boys, Pat basketball in the only small gym at the time, and borrowed track tops as part of their first uniforms. What they did have were good numbers and tough young men. With the likes of Francis and John Ruettiger and Chris Curtis they made their way to the state tourney.

Pat would leave a few years later to pursue his personal goal of becoming a school principal. He would become principal at St. Raymonds in Joliet and later St. Edmunds in Oak Park. The stress of the job, the long drive, and mounting health issues would bring him back to Providence in 1994 simply to teach and to watch with pride the successes of the program he started until his untimely

> passing in 1999. What are those successes? The various teams in 49 years have won 10 State Championships, runners up 6 other times with 6 third place trophies and one 4th place finish, not to mention scores of individual medals and other recognitions.


