

Forty-six students from the Providence Catholic graduating class of 2023 have been designated as Illinois State Scholars, representing 26% of the class.

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC), the state's college access and financial aid agency, presents this important recognition of academic achievement to exceptional Illinois high school students annually.

This year, more than 17,000 honorees join

the other outstanding students who have been honored since the designation was first introduced in 1958.

"We are very proud of our Illinois State Scholars," says Mr. Houston. "This is quite an academic achievement. Their commitment to excellence in academics truly defines them as leaders in the Providence Catholic community. We congratulate them on this success, and look forward to seeing what they accomplish as they continue their academic careers.

Seventeen students scored a 30 or The complete ACT profile for the Class of 2023 will be available at the end of the school year. For the Class of 2022, the top 10% of the class scored an average of 32.5, which is in the top five percent of all test takers in the country. The top 50% of the class scored an average of 27 on the ACT, while the average for the entire student body is 24.2 (while the national average is 21).

MENTAL HEALTH: IT MATTERS

Providence Catholic student Kailee O'Sullivan has a goal: promote mental health among athletes. To do this, she is working closely with Morgan's Message.



The goal of Morgan's Message is to "amplify stories, resources and expertise to confront student-athlete mental health, build a community by and for athletes, facilitate safe peer-to-peer conversations and provide a platform for advocacy."

Kailee O'Sullivan knows the stress of being a student-athlete - which is why she sought to learn more about Morghan's Message.

"This organization was really made to break the negative stigma around mental health," says Kailee. "The organization got its name from a Duke lacrosse player named Morgan. Morgan had the 'ideal' life to most. She played Division 1 lacrosse, had a loving family, was smart, beautiful, creative, funny, and so much more. Morgan had dealt with mental health before and had received help. She then had a very bad injury that would end up postponing her lacrosse season. Even while speaking to her parents and peers, she never opened up much about how she was feeling during this time. Morgan had written in her journal that no one could understand how she felt. She chose to stay silent and sadly committed suicide.'

"While working with Morgan's Message, I have started a club that has been having interactive meetings with whoever would like to attend," says Kailee. "We are just starting, but Providence coaches are working with me to encourage student-athletes to attend meetings when needed. My goal is to help people know that they aren't alone. If I can help at least one person get through a tough time, that's enough for me."

This initiative is important to Kailee because she related to Morgan's story. "So much," she says. "I went through a bad injury on my pitching hand and had to have three surgeries. That was definitely one of the roughest patches of my life. Everything I did was related to softball and it was taken from me in seconds and there was nothing I could do about it."

The devastation when she could barely

move at physical therapy consumed her to the point of Kailee not being able to watch any softball videos without breaking down.

"I felt like people just didn't get it and never would. If I didn't have the great support system and outlets that I had, things might be a lot different now," she says. "I found outlets other than just softball and learned that everything happens for a reason. Though it felt like my life was over, if I hadn't gotten hurt, I never would have found my current team which I love – the Lady Dukes. I never would have met the amazing people I have, I never would have developed the great work ethic I now have, and I never would have learned the valuable lesson to never take anything for granted."

Based on her personal experience, Kailee wants everyone to really understand that everything happens for a reason and that your story isn't over yet. "I promise that you aren't alone," she says.

Kailee says that the pressure athletes face today is different from the pressure athletes faced before, in her opinion. "Now things might be looked at as more serious," she adds. "Schooling is harder, which makes it harder to balance a schedule. On top of that, people are going to want some kind of social life which might make it even harder to balance a schedule. Many are competing at the highest level in their sport, so everything they have is given to that sport – time, money, experiences, etc. Although being a student-athlete can be demanding, if you find the right schedule it will be so worth it."

"For me, it was the loss of another student that really made me look at finding a way to help," says Kailee. "I did not personally know him, but I knew he was a great guy, great at baseball, and had amazing things going for him. When he was gone, there was this immense hurt in the hallways. I knew I had struggled with mental health, and I knew action needed to be taken."

It wasn't an easy start, however, as Kailee was nervous to get the club started. She wasn't sure what the feedback would be like, or how people would react to her story. It was Jeremiah Jobe and Huda Hamdan of the Providence Catholic Counseling Department that worked with Kailee on getting everything started. "Coach Jobe and Ms. Hamdan inspired me to share my story and they have supported me through every step of this process. Without them, none of this would be possible."

As to her goals for the future? "My goals are to help people go and talk to someone, whether they are an athlete or not. Mental health is real and so, so important. This year I have realized that so many more people than I thought are experiencing anxiety and/or depression. I want people to know that what they are going through is okay and not something to be ashamed of."

Another goal is to help people remember that everyone is going through a struggle of their own, whether they seem perfect or not.


"A rule that everyone should keep in mind is the golden rule, 'Treat others as you wish to be treated'," she says. "This is a basic lesson that many of us learned at a young age but is so often overlooked. If you could make that slight effort to treat someone the way you'd like to be treated, you might just make that person's day ten times better."

Most recently, he has helped with the junior varsity girls' team at Willowbrook, assisted with St. Francis boys' soccer, and will be mentoring a first-year coach at Lake Park.



This year, twenty one students were selected to participate, including 17 high schoolers and four current University of Michigan students.



Sophomore Sophia Leverett won the 2023 August Wilson New Voices Regional Competition on Monday, March 27, 2023, held at the Goodman Theatre in Chicago. "August Wilson is an African American Playright," says Dr. Stacy Eckert, Director of Choirs, Liturgical Music and Theatre at Providence Catholic. "Sophia chose a monologue, and then competed against high school and college aged students at the finals. Now, she will compete at the national finals in May. We are extremely proud of her dedication to her craft and this incredible accomplishment.'

Each issue, we feature a special segment written by Ken Raymond, a long-time teacher, coach, and proud Celtic! Kenny Ray, as he's known around school, is a guru of Providence history and will be sharing more of his stories via our social media channels.

I arrived at the Providence campus in the spring of 1965 to coach track. The principal at the time was Brother Edmund. He offered me a contract to teach in the social studies department and coach track for the 65-66 school year. The following school year, Brother Edmund was transferred and Brother Daniel took his place. There were three dynamic women who changed the course and direction of Providence: the "Big Three" are Sister Joseph Eleanor Ryan, Sister Julia Shea and Sister Janet (later Sister Jane Bodine).

Remember that Providence was originally a school for girls with a curriculum that reflected such: a basic high school curriculum with electives centered around business and secretarial skills providing job opportunities for young women. Both the Christian Brothers and the Sisters of Providence agreed that the curriculum needed improvement. Brother Dan was busy recruiting to increase the number of boys in the school; he also chaired the effort to "Save Our School". The work of establishing a more challenging curriculum fell to the Sisters of Providence.

I found Sister Joseph Eleanor Ryan quite impressive. She taught English and managed the English Department. She was quiet and scholarly, and expected excellence both of herself and her students. After teaching for nearly fifty years, she undertook a new project for

the order, travelling from Saint Mary-ofthe-Woods, IN to Rome, Italy gathering research for the cause of sainthood for Mother Theodore Guerin. Sister Eleanor's work is nearly 900 pages and has been translated into English, French, Italian and Latin. She also wrote volumes of poetry currently in the Sisters of Providence Archives. She wrote, "Call to Courage: A story of Mother Theodore Guerin". Besides being a poet, scholar, and linguist, she wrote plays and a history of the Sisters of Providence. Born in 1909, she died in 1991.

Sister Julia Shea was the last of the Providence Sisters at Providence. She was Assistant Principal for Fr. Kaffer, and much of the upgraded curriculum is attributed to her. She earned a bachelor's degree in social studies from Saint Mary-of-the Woods College and a Master's Degree in English from Indiana State University. As assistant principal, she wanted to make sure class content met high standards and that teachers were well organized and prepared. She insisted that teachers with less than five years'

experience submit written lesson plans to her. She toured classes regularly to insure that content matched presentation. After she left Providence, she would take a year sabbatical at Notre Dame before serving as an administrative assistant to the Bishop of Springfield from 1984 to 1997. She died in 2007.

The third member of the "Big Three" is Sister Janet, although she later would return to her own name, Sister Jane Bodine. The name "Bodine" in French is translated "bold one." Her father would often tell her that meeting and overcoming challenges is a Bodine way of life. Sister Jane met the challenges. Her education included a Bachelor of Science degree in Physics and English at Saint-Maryof -the Woods College and a Master's Degree in Chemistry from Notre Dame, with graduate studies in journalism and secondary school administration. Sister Jane was an assistant principal for five years. She had tireless energy, moving quickly down the halls - you had to be careful you didn't get hit by the cross she wore around her neck which swayed like a pendulum!

Sister Janet left high school teaching to devote her energy to Adult Education. In 1970 she created the United Southside Community Organization Adult Education Program in Indianapolis which she directed for eight years. She said of this ministry, "There I learned the reality of poverty, the very limited options available to the truly poor." She was awarded the Service of Mankind Award by the

Sertoma Club of Downtown Indianapolis, the first given to a woman religious. They said of her that she "personifies the ideals of a Providence nun, as expressed in the writings of Mother Theodore."

In 1978, Sister Jane created the Office of Congregational Advancement. In six years she raised funds to renovate the interior of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, the building of Karcher Hall, the north/ south wing of Mother Theodore Hall, and set the foundation for fundraising the Order continues to build upon. Her experiences and growing reputation as a pioneer in fundraising for women religious led to the Lilly Endowment in Indianapolis offering her a \$2.5 million grant to educate leaders of congregations on the principles and processes of fundraising. She has been called the "Wonder Woman of Development." She was recognized two more times by the Lilly Endowment with their service award. Born in 1919, she died in 2017.


All of this material came from the website of the Sisters of Providence. I chose these three Sisters because of their educational background, and the leadership they provided at a critical time in our school's history. Sister Jane and Sister Julia quickly realized that we needed to be coeducational not co-institutional. That was rare and in many ways groundbreaking for Catholic education in the Chicagoland area. Both merged the courses offered by the Brothers and Sisters to maximize efficiency. They determined which electives should remain and which needed to be changed to serve the needs of a school moving toward a college prep program.

I believed all three women had strong feelings for advancing the cause for women entering the field of medicine not only as nurses, but also as doctors, surgeons and technicians. Why couldn't women be lawyers, CEOs and entrepreneurs as well? They were truly trailblazers!

These three women were all born before 1920 when there were limited opportunities for women. The 19th Amendment was ratified in 1920, and these sisters used their education to benefit others, particularly women. Their strong leadership was essential at a time when Providence needed it the most. They not only talked the talk, they walked the walk.

Personally I enjoyed discussing literature with Sister Joseph Eleanor, along with her subtle humor. Sister Jane and Julia were mentors to me. As a young teacher, I needed the guidance and direction they provided. As a young department chair my interaction with Sister Julia was such a positive experience. What I remember the most are their smiles, the energy, the dedication to their professions, and the professionalism they exhibited. I was overwhelmed at how they displayed their Christian values. They accepted Christ's two great commandments; love God and love your neighbor as yourself. This they did through a lifetime of prayer, service and sacrifice.



Mr. Raymond still assists in coaching, and brought in one of his oldest pieces of spirit wear from that 1978 team - a shirt emblazoned with the number 129 on the sleeve. This number represents the number of stairs the runners had to climb at the Palos toboggan slides, where they would practice once a week. "Terry (McAlpin) Grossmeyer and Ellen Podoba were the first two," says Mr. Raymond. "I believe Gerri Schubert ran as well."


